It is going to be strange only writing four times a year now! News will be old or far ahead!

Over the last few weeks, Women's Own has got into full swing with the Rev. David Newlove taking the first meeting, followed by a Members' day when the speaker was unable to attend. Members talked about happy and memorable times in their lives. Then Eileen Mosey of Coxhill gave us a talk on her family's involvement and the help they gave to the Maasai Mara School in Kenya, which was most interesting. The next meeting was Women's Own Harvest Supper. This was then followed by one of our own Church family talking to us about being a coeliac, where you are unable to eat foods containing gluten without being ill. She has a strong Christian belief which helps her on her way. Then Mrs Ann Ward of the Salvation Army came to talk to us. Next, it was Women's Own Anniversary Rally led by the Rev. Ann, where members provided a lovely tea. On the previous Sunday, Mrs K Marr took the rally service. She said going to church was like visiting a garage to fill up with petrol – we renewed our faith and filled up with friendship and fellowship. She said people need people and people need to be needed. It gives us a feeling of self-worth and comfort. Mrs Marr gave the story of the paralysed man whose friends let him down through the roof of the house where Jesus was. They went to extreme lengths to get the man there. How can we remove the barriers to see Jesus? We can walk away from Jesus but He won't walk away from us! She said – love your neighbour as yourselves and look out for one another. Be a good example.

The Guild began again on 14th October with a talk and illustration on the Rasen Catholic Church and its' origins at Osgodby. (At the same time, it is not generally known that West Rasen was once a Roman Catholic enclave with its' own chapel and school – now the Village Hall).

This last week we had a demonstration on making a circular wreath of fresh flowers and leaves. Next week, we are going to the Haven at Grimsby as we do every year. They always entertain us beautifully and give us a lovely meal afterwards, so you can see our 'social life' is very varied!

We had a lovely Harvest Festival on 19th and 20th September with the excellent 'home grown' concert afterwards on the Saturday. Fundraising for the Nomad Trust

Many thanks to all of you who have continued to help raise money for the Nomad Trust. Over the last three months, since passing the £2500 mark, I am very pleased to inform you that we have now raised a further £85.19 since the end of July 2015. This brings the overall total to **£2663.02**

Several churches have also sent their harvest gifts to the Nomad Trust, and all contributors may be interested in this extract from the summer newsletter:

“Around 16,000 meals a year, including breakfast and supper are prepared and served, 7 days a week at the Nomad Trust Night Shelter on Monks Road by our cook Jane. This is all made possible by the generosity of Lincoln Cathedral and many other churches in the area... Without your help we would not be able to fulfil this role and provide the much needed support to the homeless and in needy.

These donations also enable the Shelter to provide basic household starter packs, such as cutlery, pots, pans and food packs to those moving on from the shelter into the YMCA and other accommodation. Personal items such as soaps, shower gels, razors, deodorants and washing powder are also very much appreciated. There is nothing better than a hot shower and cup of tea to lift anyone's spirits on a cold winter's night.”

TESTIMONY CORNER

I hope you are enjoying this new format for the Link.

The Circuit Leadership Team, at their Vision Day in October suggested this Testimony Corner, giving people the opportunity to share their testimony and to encourage one another as we hear such stories of growing in faith.

So as this is my last contribution to the Link, it seemed appropriate for me to write the first one.

Brought up in the Church of England, going through SS and Youth Fellowship I had a somewhat superstitious faith. If I didn't do as my elders and betters taught me I was in danger of God sending a thunderbolt! At the age of about 14 I went to a Christian Union holiday and met there a girl a little older who had something I wanted - a 'genuine kindness' perhaps described it. It dawned on me that what she had was Jesus in her life and so I gave my life to Jesus. Not sure I turned into the person I wanted to be but it was certainly a start.

I went to University to study theology and then taught RE in secondary education.

When I entered University I had the misguided view that maybe by the time I graduated women would be accepted for Anglican ministry - something which would only happen some twenty plus years later.

Meeting Mike at university I began attending a Methodist church with him and became a member of the Methodist Church after we were married. Any thought of ordination well and truly put to bed.

During our time in Lincoln it would be true to say God got hold of me by the scruff of the neck and rekindled a passionate faith in me culminating in a call to Local Preaching in 1989 as we moved from Lincoln to Grimsby.

This led to a call to ordained ministry particularly to local ministry in Keelby where we were living.

With a passion for people to come to know the love of God for themselves, ministry led me into mission and evangelism, becoming District Mission Enabler and so to Gainsborough as Circuit Mission Enabler, and in the past two years circuit minister in Wolds & Trent.

So that's my journey.

I once asked a congregation to pause and think what their life would be like without Jesus in it. As I reflected on the question I realised I certainly wouldn't be standing in that pulpit. For not only has God been with me since I gave my life to Jesus, not only has he called me to step out of my comfort zone and do things I never dreamt I would be able to do, but he has also equipped me.

A few weeks ago I sat at a concert in one of my churches as the choir sang 'You Raise Me Up' and I realised that the words summed up my experience of Jesus in my life.

You raise me up so I can stand on mountains
You raise me up to walk on stormy seas
I am strong when I am on your shoulders
You raise me up to more than I can be.

As I leave circuit ministry my prayer is that each one of us may experience for ourselves the difference Jesus can make to our lives and realise that difference will always be for the good, always more fulfilling and always more challenging than it would be without Him.

God bless you all and thank you for allowing me to minister amongst you - it has been a privilege.
