## Pastoral Letter

Having just marked Remembrance Sunday in November the next few months also offer us opportunities for reflection and remembering.

In December and the weeks approaching Christmas we reflect once again on the mystery of the incarnation as we celebrate the birth of Jesus our Saviour. As we remember, we are also reminded of the significance and hope which was symbolised in that amazing event.

In our chapels we renew our covenantal relationship with God again when we participate in Covenant Services and respond to the demands of being a follower of Jesus. As we renew our covenant we also look forward with hope and expectation to where God will lead us as individuals and churches.



Our chapel was one of three in our scattered Northumbrian mining village. It was a small building with a raised platform at one end and a very small balcony at the other. The platform housed the organ and choir stalls whilst the balcony seating could be easily converted into long tables for social events; where we ate delicious home-made bread, biscuits, scones and cakes filled with jam. Behind the platform was the preacher's vestry and at the other end of the building, alongside the small entrance and vestibule, was the steward's vestry. In this place I learned to sing, to read and recite aloud and most importantly, to listen. Here I heard the word of God through bible reading and preaching. I learned to pray and tried to follow the urging of the hymn writer to "Trust and Obey".

Sunday School was at two o'clock and evening service at five. I remember sitting in the back pew with my parents and dozing through the service, stretched out on the long hard seats.

Our wonderful Sunday School Superintendent encouraged us through the annual Scripture exam and delighted in our success and soothed our distress when things did not go quite so well. Sunday School Anniversaries and the Circuit Youth Festivals brought highlights and challenges to this stage of my life. I will never forget that place and those people.

There I made the first overt demonstration that I had accepted Jesus Christ as my personal saviour when, following membership classes, I was received into membership of the Methodist Church.

The teenage years brought questions and doubts; debates in the Youth Fellowship 'intellectual discussions' with student peers once I had left for university; a first job, a new church, becoming involved in the Youth Club and the Mission Band There were times when I moved away from my God, but he waited patiently, forgiveness and salvation, waiting, always waiting.

Marriage, children, career, leading to moves up and down the country, different churches different groups of people. There was a time of refreshing when through by now married daughter I encountered the Pentecostal Church in Illinois, USA.

I try to be truly thankful that God has put so many helpers and supports in my way, ministers, family, friends, people that I have scarcely known but who, looking back have been there in the right place at the right time. My journey continues, an ordinary life, an extraordinary saviour. Again in the words of another great hymn writer "all I have needed thy hand has provided, great is thy faithfulness Lord unto me".

Thank you to Babs Fraser from Caistor who wrote the last Testimony. Can you guess who this one is written by?

### **A personal journey**

“The most important part of our task will be to tell everyone who will listen, that Jesus is the only answer to the problems that are disturbing the hearts of men and nations.

We shall have the right to speak because we can tell from our experience that his light is more powerful than the deepest darkness.....How wonderful that the reality of his presence is greater than the reality of the hell about us.” Betsie ten Boom

Betsie ten Boom, sister of author and speaker Corrie ten Boom, died in a Nazi concentration camp during World War Two.

Although I was born during that war I and my generation have been blessed by not having personally experienced the horrors that fell upon Betsie and her fellow human beings.

My faith has never been called into account in the way that Betsie describes. My journey has been a simpler one but it has been filled with ups and downs, the great joys and deep sadnesses, the rough and the smooth that have been part of an ordinary life. However I can say that I share with her, in my own way, the understanding that the Lord Jesus Christ sits at the centre of my life and is there when I call out in trouble, to be thanked in times of great joy and to be served throughout the hum drum of usual daily life. I am not always so good at the ‘thanking and serving’ part, but I am working on it!

I cannot pin point a specific Damascus moment. There have been times when I have felt my God to be close at hand, that “Blessed Assurance” described by the hymn writer; just as there have been times when I have allowed myself to be separated from him.

With the wisdom of hindsight I can see a pathway, a journey of faith, peppered with people, places and events that have influenced and continue to form my personal relationship with Christ.

Like many others my story begins in Sunday School. I must have been about three years old when the daughter of my grandparents’ next door neighbour first called to take me to Sunday school.


