There will, with careful adjustment and pruning, be space for new opportunities and risks to be taken with new activities. In our churches there is space for lots of different activity, but it is always good to reassess things from time to time; perhaps let some unproductive things go, be bold to be led by God and venture into the unknown with something new. What are the things which are attractive and vibrant? What are the activities which will allow us to share our faith with others?

Whatever the stage of the plants in the garden they all need some ‘TLC’ at some point; most all need water, often added nourishment and nutrients in some form or other.

Whatever we do in our churches it needs the covering of prayer, the guidance of the Holy Spirit and its foundations in God’s word so that we are truly seeking God’s way, as we reach out to people in our communities and share His love.

We have had a busy April in Chapel. Some services stand out more than others I find! On LWPT Sunday (Leaders of the Worship and Preachers' Trust, formally known as Local Preachers Mutual Aid), is when preachers change round and preach outside their circuit.
