

# Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

How time flies by, a few years ago two circuits explored ways in which they may work together to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ. How we could put that news into action and change the lives of people in our communities, both committed Christians and those who have yet to find Jesus. This vision of mission was a strong common goal for both of us.

Some folk feared the union of our circuits, wondering how churches many miles apart could indeed function in such a circuit. The answer was that we are not individual churches in a circuit, but that we as individuals are joined together by God's Spirit making up the Church of Jesus Christ across The Trent and Wolds area of Lincolnshire. Each one of us has a part to play in our own local communities as we see the needs around us and attempt to deal with them. Sometimes we may wonder what have I to offer? So often we underestimate what affect on our communities God can have through us, if only we are prepared to let Him.

Andrew started his letter in our September Link with these words

**“ You are the body of Christ and each one of you is a part of it.”**

1 Cor 12:27

We are all aware of the part Paul played in the very early days of our church and how he helped to spread the Word of God around the world. Some of you will know that I often think about an early member of the church, just an ordinary member of a Christian church much like any one of us. He was a man of strong faith and knew the love of God as we do. I often wonder if he realised what affect on the world he had, he is only mentioned once in our bible, his name is Ananias. He is the man who answered God's call and restored Saul's sight, who we now know as Paul. As God restored Pauls sight and used him to proclaim the Gospel, so will God use each of us to fulfil the mission vision we have for the people of our Wolds and Trent Circuit in Lincolnshire.

A vision that starts with us working in our local communities and will cover the whole new circuit in God's love by His saving Grace.

***“Treasure from King Solomon’s Temple ~ has it been found?”***

**On: Friday, 8th November @ 7:30pm**

Local amateur archaeologist, Philip Clark, believes he may have discovered some of the treasures from the fabled Temple of King Solomon ~ lost for over 2,500 years! He will be presenting his findings, for the first time, in Grimsby on Friday evening, 8th November, at the Ice House Christian Centre on Victor Street, Grimsby.

Earlier this year Philip was able to view some of this suspected treasure and confirm that it could well have come from the Temple King Solomon built in Jerusalem.

Philip has visited Israel and Jerusalem on a number of occasions, and led a number of groups there as well.

Philip studied Archaeology at the University of Hull and received a coveted award from the British Archaeology Association in 2004. He was particularly cited for the academic excellence of his work on the pre-history of the East Yorkshire Wolds. Philip’s interest in archaeology was probably sparked by his living in the British Museum with his Grandparents early on in his life (*his Grandfather worked at the British Museum and had a flat within it*).


